Grafton's Memorial Day History

CEMETERY HISTORY: During the early years of The Civil War, the dead were buried in fields and church yards, or close to the hospitals and prison camps where they died. On July 17, 1862, President Lincoln signed legislation which authorized the creation of the first National Cemeteries. In 1865, when Samuel Swinton Burdette, Commander in Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic visited Pruntytown, he toured the battle grounds of the area and conceived the idea of having all war dead in the area reburied in a location accessible from all parts of the new West Virginia. Burdett introduced a bill in Congress to establish a National Cemetery in Northern West Virginia. The bill was approved, and the War Department ordered Major R.C. Bates to select a site. Bates decided on Grafton, because of its location and the availability of the railroad, and he contacted the heirs of Alexander Yates for approximately four acres of land between Walnut Street and the Baltimore and Ohio right of way in what was called West Grafton.

Grafton National Cemetery was established in 1867 by an Act of Congress. Work on the cemetery started in the early spring of 1867, and an observance was held to honor the dead, which is where our history began. In 1868, the cemetery was completed, and Major Bates contacted James Breedlove to exhume the bodies of 68 soldiers who had been buried on upper Maple Avenue and cart them to the new cemetery. The remaining dead were gathered from various battlefields, camps, and hospitals situated in 32 Counties of West Virginia. Within two years 1,251 bodies of both Union and Confederate Troops of the Civil War were interred in Grafton under the supervision of the U.S. Burial Corps. 664 of the gravesites are for Unknown Soldiers and are identified by numbered, 8 inch square, headstones, and burial records indicate only from what state or location the bodies were disinterred. Among those buried are white and black, women, children, 12 members of the famous Volunteer Regiment of the Army who adopted the dress and skill of Zouaves, a body of Infantry in the French service noted for their dash and valor, and Thornsberry Bailey Brown, the first union soldier killed in the Civil War. In 1987, the West Virginia National Cemetery was dedicated in Pruntytown, ensuring that Grafton remains the home of the only National Cemeteries in WV.

PARADE HISTORY: Following the small observance in 1867, in 1868, Captain Wilson aligned Veterans of Company B, 2nd, 17th West Virginians, fifer of the 5th Calvary, George Hammond, musician of the 12th Infantry, snare drummers Clinton Albright, Millard Carr, Henry Lippencott, Edward W. Walters, and bass drummer Joseph N. Shannon. The assembled procession moved down St. John Street, across the "Boardwalk", then across the railroad bridge to West Grafton, where they were joined by the citizens of Grafton, who proceeded to march out Pearl Street to the cemetery. At the cemetery, there were so many unburied bodies still lying on the ground that the procession continued past the cemetery to Handley's Grove where Reverend George Davidson, Pastor of the Baptist Church, asked the devine blessing and the Honorable Jacob B. Bristor gave the first Memorial Day Address. Thus began our parade tradition. The following year, decorating the graves began when Mayor William Mallonee issued a proclamation asking all citizens to lay aside their tasks "at bench, forge, and shops" and join the Civil War Veterans in observance of "Flower Strewing Day" on the 30th of May. He requested that those who grew flowers donate liberally to children who would call for them and place them on the graves. This is how the tradition of school children bearing flowers for the dead began. In 1882, Reno Post Number 7, Grafton Unit of the Grand Army of the Republic, was organized and they adopted the more appropriate name of "Memorial Day."

For 157 years, Graftonians have come together to honor and remember our fallen heroes. In addition to the solemn remembrance of the price they paid, we also celebrate the beautiful life their sacrifice afforded us, with music, dancing, and entertainment. Our celebration is a beautiful mixture of tears, respect, gratitude, and joy. It is our sincerest hope that this tradition will carry on for generations to come, proving that while some may not see the true meaning of this sacred day, Grafton will never forget.

Willis Nestor 157th Memorial Day Parade Grand Marshall

Willis Nestor was born at home in the Lucritia area of Grafton, WV on March 10, 1932, the son of Lorn and Onda Nestor. His Family moved to a farm in Knottsville in 1939. His siblings included 1 brother and 7 sisters. He grew up after the end of the depression and learned at a young age the value of hard work.

Willis graduated from Grafton High School in 1950. He wanted to serve his country during the Korean War so on march 25, 1951 he enlisted in the United States Air Force as an Airman 1st Class, 20th Air Force. Willis traveled 3 days by train from WV to San Antonio, Texas for his Bootcamp. From there he was sent to Blairsville, Pennsylvania and then on to Cheyenne, Wyoming to attend mechanic and advanced welding school. In March 1952 Willis was transferred to Camp Stoneman, California. After 13 days at camp Stoneman, He was shipped to Okinawa, Japan on the ship "The Anderson". It took 18 days form California to reach Okinawa. He was stationed at a B29 Base in Okinawa. His two year stay in Okinawa consisted of construction and mechanic work as well as lots of Guard Duty.

Willis left Okinawa in March 1954 on the ship "The Mitchell". It took 17 days to return to the States. He was stationed in Missouri until he was honorably discharged on March 24, 1955.

After returning home, Willis went to work for the B&O Railroad working in many different departments. On August 2, 1958, he married Patricia Bolyard spending 56 wonderful years together. The marriage gave them 5 children and as of today Willis has 14 grandchildren, 23 great -grandchildren and 1 great-great-grandchild. Willis retired on March 10, 1994 as a brakeman conductor with over 38 years with the Railroad.

Willis is a longtime member of the Knottsville United Methodist Church. He is a lifetime member of the Taylor County VFW. He is also a member of the Grafton Masonic Lodge #15, the Scottish Rite 32nd Degree, the Osiris Shrine Club and the Taylor County Shrine Club.

Willis is most proud to be a volunteer member of the Taylor County Honor Guard. He joined the Honor Guard in 1997 and as of the end of 2023 he has participated in over 3,000 military funerals. Willis is currently the oldest member (92 years old) of the Honor Guard with a few not far behind him in age. Willis would like to encourage all veterans, young or old, to volunteer with their local Honor Guard so they can continue to render military honors to veterans and their families during funeral services.



Jessica Lynch Parade Marshall

Jessica Lynch is a former Private First Class (PFC) in the United States Army and a Former Prisoner of War. On March 23, 2003, she was injured and captured by Iraqi Forces after her unit was ambushed in Iraq. She was rescued after nine days in captivity on April 1, 2003 by U.S. special operations forces. Jessica's rescue was the first successful rescue of an American POW since World War II.

Today, Jessica speaks to various groups around the United States about overcoming her obstacles and how perseverance helped her survive. Jessica futher explains that despite the most difficult circumstances — what ever they might be — a positive outlook and determination can truly help individuals live fulfilling lives and accomplish their goals.

Jessica has a Bachelors of Arts Degree for Elementary Education K-6 and a Masters of Arts degree in Communication Studies.

Jessica has appeared on Good Morning America, Today Show, CBS Morning Show, Huckabee Show, CNN, MSNBC, David Letterman Show, Fox, Prime Time on ABC with Dianne Sawyer, E News!, CBN, and various local networks throughout the country. She has appeared on numerous magazine covers such as TIME and People. She has been named West Virginian of the Year as well as Glamour magazine Woman of the Year.

MAC WARNER Speaker- Grafton National Cemetery

WV Secretary of State Mac Warner is serving in his second term as the state's chief elections officer. Secretary Warner is a graduate of the United States Military Academy at West

United States Military Academy at West Point and a graduate of the West Virginia



University College of Law. He earned Master of Law degrees from the University of Virginia Law School and the Army's Judge Advocate General's School.

During his 23-year career in the United States Army, Secretary Warner served on four continents, deploying to military hot spots around the world. He retired at the rank of Lt. Colonel.

Following military retirement, Secretary Warner worked with the U.S. State Department in Afghanistan for five years serving as the Chief of the Organizational Capacity Building Section of the world's largest Rule of Law program. Secretary Warner was first elected to his position in November 2016 and was reelected in 2020. Secretary Warner's passion for transparent, fair and fraud-free elections has generated a renewed confidence in West Virginia voters. Because of his military background and keen interest in election cyber security, Secretary Warner has earned West Virginia national attention as a leader in protecting voter databases and elections systems.

As the state's chief business officer, Secretary Warner manages the licensing and registration of more than 143,000 business organizations operating in West Virginia. In 2018, he opened the first 4-agency, single-location, business and licensing center in the nation. Today, the WV One Stop Business Center is a model for other states. What used to take up to 10 days to register and open a new business in West Virginia can now take less than two hours. Secretary Warner and his wife, Debbie Law Warner, have been married for 41 years. They raised four children in Monongalia County – all of whom are serving, or have served, in the United States military. The Warner's have seven grandchildren....with one more on the way.



Mr. Colosky also served as an Engineering Equipment Operator Work Leader in 2018 at Dayton National Cemetery.

When you think of Memorial Day, you might think of pool parties, barbecues and parades, but Memorial Day is so much more than that. Soldiers gave everything just so we could live freely. They deserve every ounce of respect there is. Memorial Day is important because we need to honor all American veterans who gave their lives in sacrifice to our country. These soldiers gave up everything in their own lives to fight for ours. These men and women made the

Grafton takes pride in having two national cemeteries. A national cemetery is a cemetery for people who have served in the armed forces. William C. Nicholas Memorial Award

For over 20 years Dr. William C. Nicholas, "Dr. Nick," was the heart and soul of Grafton's Memorial Day Parade. He, along with others, formed the West Virginia Memorial Day Committee, Inc., in order to continue the Memorial Day traditions that helped define this town. He strived to honor the holiday, along with bringing joy to the thousands of patrons that attended the annual parade, and the National Cemetery Programs at the Grafton National Cemetery and the West Virginia National Cemetery. Dr. Nicholas devoted a huge part of his life and personal finances so that Memorial Day would be remembered for the City of Grafton, State of West Virginia and the United States. On May 30, 1999, Governor Cecil Underwood awarded Dr. Nicholas the Distinguished West Virginian Award for service to the WV Memorial Day Committee. "Dr. Nick" was also a licensed pyrotechnician and provided the fireworks for the Memorial Day weekend and for the Taylor County Fair. Sadly, and suddenly, we lost "Dr. Nick" in March of 2009. In 2018, friends and committee members passed a motion to honor him by presenting an award in his name. Each year we remember "Dr. Nick" with the William C. Nicholas Memorial Award, by presenting it to a person/company that has continuously supported the committee and community during the Memorial Day weekend. Honor Court Initiative

The Memorial Day Parade in Grafton, West Virginia has been taking place for more than 150 years and, as a result, continues to be one of the longest running events of its kind. During the earlier years of this event, it was a tradition that school students and staff were asked to participate and demonstrate their respect for our fallen by wearing white and carrying an American flag, along with a small bouquet of flowers, that would be placed on graves at the Grafton National Cemetery.

More recently, that tradition has nearly disappeared. While our schools continue to participate, and the parade has continued to expand as a celebration, many seem to have lost the more traditional components of wearing white and bearing flowers. As a result, the Memorial Day Parade Committee has decided to re-introduce a small portion of the original tradition by introducing an "Honor Court" of representatives from the Taylor County School system. These chosen Honor Court members will be dressed in all white, both during the Memorial Day parade, and at the observance scheduled at Grafton National Cemetery, where they will place flowers on the graves of some of our fallen.






